Photography Competition : **'Verwood Through the Lens'** Rules covering Spring Show classes 53/54/55/56 [in addition to Show Rules found in the back of this booklet] :

Photo Competition Terms & Conditions

- a) This competition is open to amateur photographers only. Entrants must not be professional photographers. For the purposes of this competition, we consider a professional photographer to be someone who makes more than half their annual income from the sale of their photographs.
- b) All entries must be the original work of the entrant and must not infringe the rights of any other party. Further, entrants must not have breached any laws when taking their photographs.
- c) The entrant can submit a maximum of 2 images in each category.
- d) A4 and A5 photo prints must be mounted, smaller photos may be mounted or unmounted. ** We encourage entrants to submit larger prints for this competition**. Maximum A4 size inclusive of mount.
- e) Clearly label each entry on the back of the photo or mount with :
 - i. The photographer's name;
 - ii. The category being entered.
 - iii. Where specifically the photo has been taken.

The photographer's name should not appear on the front of the print or mount.

- f) Standard photo proportions only (ie. no panoramic, square, elongated etc submissions)
- g) Photo prints can be dropped at the Show Manager's address before 14 March, otherwise entrant to bring to the Verwood Memorial Hall between 8.30 and 11am on 16 March.
- h) Photo prints must remain in-situ on display for the Show duration and can be collected after 4.30pm.
- i) As well as the print to be judged, the image needs to be available in digital format and of an A3 quality/size (10MB or above) to allow winning photos to be enlarged.
- j) The entrant confirms images taken of private gardens/property other than that of the entrant must have the permission of the owner. This is the sole responsibility of the entrant.
- k) The entrant confirms images containing identifiable people have their permission before submission. The entrant must secure the permission of parents or guardians for the photographs of minors or vulnerable adults This is the sole responsibility of the entrant.
- By submitting a photo, the entrant is also granting permission for the image, if selected, to be reproduced once for display in the hall and for any publicity of the competition in local press and social media.
- m) Entrants under the age of 12 years needs to have parent or guardian consent to enter.
- All entries will be judged by a panel of judges who will select the winning images which, in their opinion, best promote Verwood. The entrant's name will not be visible to the judging panel. They will consider a range of factors including composition, overall impact, originality, interesting subject matter and the appeal of the photographs. The judges' decision will be final and no correspondence can be entered into. The winning entries will be chosen during the Spring Show judging between 11am and 1.30pm on 16 March 2024. Prizes will be awarded during prize giving at 4pm.
- o) Family members of the judging panel are not permitted to enter the competition.
- p) A number [tbc] of photo entries will be selected by a panel of independent judges for enlargement and permanent display in the Memorial Hall. Of these, the judges will select 1st, 2nd and 3rd placings which will win Amazon gift vouchers : £100 First Prize, £30 Second Prize, and £20 Third Prize. There will not be any cash alternative to these prizes.
- q) By entering, entrants will be deemed to have agreed to be bound by these rules and the judges reserve the right to exclude any entry from the competition at any time at their absolute discretion if they have reason to believe that an entrant has breached these rules.

Ingredients

375g plain flourPinch salt225g butter, diced150g mature cheddar, grated

50g freshly grated Parmesan Pinch English mustard powder, Small pinch cayenne pepper 2 free-range eggs, yolks only

Method

- 1. Sift the flour and a pinch of salt into a bowl. Using your fingertips, rub in the butter until all the lumps are gone and the texture is like fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the cheese, mustard powder, cayenne, and egg yolks. Add 4-5 tablespoons of cold water and mix to a firm dough.
- 2. Wrap in cling film or a reusable plastic bag and chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 190C / 375F / Gas 5.
- 4. Line a baking sheet with baking paper. Roll out the dough to a square, roughly the thickness of a £2 coin. Cut the square in half, then cut each half into 1cm/½in strips.
- 5. Transfer carefully onto the lined baking sheet and bake for 10-15 minutes, until crisp, then leave to cool on the tray.

SPRING RECIPE (51) : DATE AND APPLE SQUARES

Ingredients

225g butter, plus a little extra for greasing
140g cooking apples, peeled, cored and chopped
140g stoned dates, chopped
280g light soft brown sugar
175g plain flour
1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
100g porridge oats

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 190C / 170C fan / gas 5. Grease an 18cm square tin and line with baking parchment.
- 2. Tip the apples into a pan with 2 tbsp water. Bring to the boil and simmer on a low heat for 5 mins until tender and slightly pulpy. Add the dates and 50g of the sugar, and cook for a further 5 mins. Take off the heat and break the apples down with the back of a spoon until smooth and well mixed with the dates. Set aside.
- 3. Gently melt the butter in a saucepan. Mix the flour, bicarb, oats and remaining sugar in a bowl. Pour in the melted butter and stir well until oats are coated.
- Press half the mixture firmly into the tin, spread the apple mix on top and smooth over. Cover with the remaining oat mixture and press down. Bake for 30-35 mins until golden and firm. Cool in the tin before cutting into squares.

Ingredients

225g unsalted butter, softened 225g caster sugar 4 eggs 225g self-raising flour 1 lemon, zested For the drizzle topping : 1½ lemons, juiced 85g caster sugar

Method

- 1. Heat the oven to 180C / 160C fan / gas 4.
- 2. Beat together the butter and caster sugar until pale and creamy, then add the eggs, one at a time, slowly mixing through.
- 3. Sift in the self-raising flour, then add the lemon zest and mix until well combined.
- 4. Line a loaf tin (8 x 21cm) with greaseproof paper, then spoon in the mixture and level the top with a spoon.
- 5. Bake for 45-50 mins until a thin skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean.
- 6. While the cake is cooling in its tin, mix together the lemon juice and caster sugar to make the drizzle.
- 7. Prick the warm cake all over with a skewer or fork, then pour over the drizzle the juice will sink in and the sugar will form a lovely, crisp topping.
- 8. Leave in the tin until completely cool, then remove and serve. [Top Tip : Will keep in an airtight container for 3-4 days, or freeze for up to 1 month.]

SHOW RULES

Flower, Plants, Fruit and Vegetables to be judged to 2008 Edition of the RHS Show Handbook

1. Eligibility of Competitors

All horticultural classes are open to amateur gardeners. An Amateur is a person who grows plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables for pleasure and enjoyment, and not for his/her livelihood. If they employ a gardener, full or part-time, they can exhibit their product from their garden, but it must be in their own name and not in the gardener's name. Anyone who is employed as a gardener can exhibit in his/her own name provided the produce is from his/her own garden or allotment.

2. Exhibits

(a) Sections for Plants, Fruit, Flowers and Vegetables

These must be the property of the exhibitor and must have been grown from seed, owned, or cared for by the exhibitor for at least two months before the date of the Show. The garden or land where exhibits are grown must be open for inspection if required by a representative of the Committee preceding or after a Show. The diameter of a pot is the inside measurement at the top not including the roll or rim. No bottles or jam jars are be used. The word "kind" is used in the classification of fruit, vegetables, and flowers e.g. apples, grapes are kinds of fruit. Carrots, onions are kinds of vegetables. Marigold, petunias are kinds of flowers The natural bloom on fruit should not be removed.

(b) Flower Arranging Section

Natural Plant Material must predominate in all classes according to the National Association of Flower Arranging Societies (NAFAS) Competitions Manual 3rd Edition (2015), by which the competitive flower arranging classes will be judged. An exhibit is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specific in a show schedule. All measurements are approximate. Background, bases, containers, drapes, exhibit titles and mechanics may always be included in an exhibit, unless otherwise stated. More than one placement may always be included, unless otherwise stated. In all exhibits natural plant material must predominate. All exhibits

must be the unaided work of the competitor and may be assembled prior to the show or in the hall on show day. A 'Novice' is someone who has not won a first prize in the flower arranging classes at the Verwood Horticultural Society. Note : these rules do not apply to Men's class.

(c) Homecraft

All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor. No trade names on lids or jars and never mix wax discs with screwtop lids for marmalade, jams, chutney and jelly. Lemon Curd must always have a wax disc and cellophane cover, never a screw top lid. Quiches and flans must not be displayed in a metal container. Exhibitors should note that a quiche should be cooked in a single operation whereas the contents of a flan are cooked separately from the case before the contents are spread into the separately cooked flan case. IMPORTANT : ALL FOOD ENTRIES WILL BE PROTECTED WITH A PLASTIC COVERING PROVIDED BY THE SOCIETY.

(d) Photographs and Handicrafts.

All entries must be the work of the exhibitor and must not have been exhibited in the previous 2 years.

3. Entries

All entries should be made in accordance with the instructions in the class details for each Show.

4. Entry Fee

There are no fees for Shows.

5. Number of Entries Allowed

No competitor may enter more than one exhibit in any class.

6. Acceptance of Entries

The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry, and in event of such refusal it is not required to give any reason or explanation.

7. Staging

Staging times are shown with each show. Any exhibitor who requires assistance to carry entries from the car park (or vice versa) should speak to a Committee member/Show Steward. Exhibitors may use their own "containers" but care should be taken to ensure that these do not infringe the class requirements. The Society has a supply of vases for use in the Flower Sections which are available for use during the show only. They must not be removed from the hall. Whilst prime responsibility for ensuring that entries conform to class requirements rests with the exhibitor, committee members and/or Show Stewards will give assistance during staging wherever possible. Exhibits which may need to be moved for staging purposes will be done by Committee/Show Stewards only. At the end of the staging period all persons must leave the Show premises with the exception of those on duty or those detained by the Show Manager.

8. Naming of Exhibits

It would be appreciated by the public and assist the Judges if, where possible, exhibitor name the varieties of their exhibits. Plain white cards 8cm x 3cm must be used and block letters are recommended.

9. Exhibit Cards

Each exhibit must bear a card provided by the Show Manager on the Show premises within the time allowed for staging and must be in position by the end of the staging period. Exhibitors will be responsible for checking the particulars given on the card and for placing them face downwards on the Show bench.

10. Rules for Judging.

(a) Awards may be revised. Awards in any class may be withheld or modified on the recommendation of the Judge if the entries be of insufficient merit.

(b) Decisions. The decision of the Judges shall be final as to the relative merits of the exhibits and the decision of the Committee shall be final on all matters connected with the Show.

(c) Protests. Any protest must be delivered in writing to the Show Secretary while the Show is still open.

(d) Alteration of Exhibits. Between the time fixed for the completion of the staging and the closing hour of the Show, no exhibit may be altered without the permission of the Show Manager.

(e) The Rules. The Show will be generally governed by the 2008 Edition of the R.H.S Show Handbook and the 2015 Edition of the NAFAS Competitions Manual, copies of which are available from the Show Manager on short term loan.

11. Removal of Exhibits

No exhibit may be removed before the end of the Show. In the interest of visitors arriving late, this rule will be strictly enforced.

12. Liability of Loss

All exhibits, personal property, etc. will be at the risk of the exhibitor at all times and the Committee will not be liable for loss or damage due to any cause whatsoever. You might be asked to pay for any loss or damage while the trophy is in your care.

13. Trophies

All Trophies are perpetual and must be returned at least one week before the respective show to the Show Manager in a clean, undamaged condition please. Charges may be made for any damage incurred. If not you may be considered unsuitable to win a trophy next year.

14. Prizes

Any prize voucher won cannot be exchanged for an alternative. The categories with voucher prizes attached are included in the Show Handbook.

15. Photos

Photographs may be taken during the Spring, Summer or Autumn Shows and used as publicity with local press and on the VDHS website.

'The Great Verwood Grow Off' Rules covering Autumn Show classes 98/99/100 [in addition to Show Rules above]

16. Eligibility of Competitors - limited to GVGO (Autumn classes 98, 99, 100)

The entrant must be aged between 3 and 15 years old on 9 September 2024. All entries must be made with the consent of a parent or guardian. A 'Photo Usage Agreement' form must be filled in and signed by the parent or guardian of the entrant. This will be part of the entry form submitted.

17. Rules for Judging - limited to GVGO (Autumn classes 98, 99, 100) Measuring –

i) Sunflowers - the metric measurements submitted by the entrant will be used to determine the tallest sunflower. The tallest sunflower will be awarded the prize. Photographic evidence showing the entrant with the sunflower must be submitted - either a photo or printed photo. This image will be used as part of the Show display and will be available to the public to view.

ii) Calendula - the Judge will examine the entries and determine 1st, 2nd, 3rd prize depending on which vases they deem to be "most beautiful". The entries will be judged blind. Judge's decision is final. See Section 10 for rules.
 iii) Pumpkin - the Judge will weigh the pumpkin entries using the same measuring scales for all entries. The heaviest pumpkin will be awarded the prize.
